PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I commenced my tenure as the President of Bethel Bible College of the Caribbean - Jamaica (BBCC-J) on September 1, 2022. I am grateful to God primarily for His grace upon and His faithfulness throughout my life so far. I am also grateful to the Administrative Bishop of the New Testament Church of God in Jamaica, Rev. Dr Roy Notice, and the National Executive Council (NEC) for their vote of confidence in me in appointing me to this prestigious position in our blessed denomination.

There is no doubt that a new era has dawned in the forward movement of Bethel Bible College of the Caribbean- Jamaica. The Rev. Dr. Donald Roberts

served the College exceptionally well for a decade. He was a visionary, transformational, and wise leader. For all of that, he must be commended highly. As I take the College forward, I am standing on his shoulders as well as the shoulders of several other outstanding leaders who served as Principal/President of this noble institution. Therefore, it is clear to me that there are greater days ahead for BBCC-J.

The "greater days" to which I am referring will come as we take the College forward based on 7 Pillars of Progress as follows: Identity and Mission, Growth and Expansion, Reimagination and Innovation, Agility and Acceleration, Professionalism and Accessibility, Experience and Empowerment, and Professionalism and Success. These Pillars of Progress have been the starting point for what we have done so far in this academic year.

What have we done or accomplished to this point? We have renovated the campus facilities. Two staff members were replaced, and three persons joined the staff and faculty. We made a few changes with respect to the offices that administrative personnel occupy and utilize. We have also procured and installed new office signs on all office doors. Staff and faculty salaries were increased by 10%. We resumed our critical residential programme and our student population increased by 15%. Thanks to the Administrative Bishop, the Bethel Support Programme was revived and relaunched.

In our recently held graduation exercise, we reflected on the theme "Forward Together with Pentecostal Spirituality, Divine Capacity, and Uncommon Agility." This theme was chosen for significant reasons. The College continues its forward march as we build on the foundation of the significant strides that it has made over the past 79 years. Although we are advancing into what I believe is a great future, we will be guided by our Holiness-Pentecostal theological perspectives and traditions on which the College is built.

As we move closer to the 80th anniversary of this noble institution, I am anticipating that we will mobilize the board, administrative and ancillary staff, faculty, students, and alumni to mark this historic achievement in fine style. Several initiatives will be rolled out in this regard. A launch event has been scheduled for February 1, 2023. The Bethel 80 Planning Committee will begin its work soon.

We anticipate a tremendous academic year as we continue to work hard and pray even harder. The board, administration, faculty, and students express their appreciation to all the denominational leaders, district overseers, and local church pastors in the New Testament Church of God - Jamaica for their undying commitment to and unswerving support for BBCC-J. We believe that as we take Bethel to new levels of achievement and success, our great denomination and, by extension, our nation will benefit significantly, and our God will be glorified.
